Tribute to Founding Members

We have just come through a very sad time in Rush Sailing Club. A time that has been life changing for many of our members and one that has closed off our links with the founding of the club in 1954.

On Sat. 22nd. Sept. founder member Tony Bollard died at the ripe old age of 91.

Although Tony had reached such an advanced age he could never have been regarded as old. Less than 10 yrs.

ago I raced with him in a Mermaid race in which no quarter was given despite the fact he was well in his eighties. He hopped from the long-liner in choppy conditions onto the deck of the Mermaid as if he were a young man in his twenties. Tony was a trustee of the club for the last thirty years taking on that role when he retired from active committee work and his many terms as Commodore and never lost his interest in the club and how it was progressing.

A brief nine weeks later and still reeling from the loss of Tony another life-long member Nellie Dunne died on 23rd. Nov. Like Tony, Nellie had given her all to RSC and early in the 2,000's had along with her friend Phyliss Bollard received a special award from the ISA for fifty years of voluntary work in support of sailing and water sports. During the almost sixty years since the foundation of the club there would not have been any event that Nellie was not involved in. She would have catered for every event and indeed on occasion would have double jobbed by assisting with race management. Contrary to the facilities available today, basic would not even begin to describe the conditions under which Nellie and her helpers would have worked. Known to hundreds of sailing folk throughout the country, very many of them attended her funeral, and we were very happy to be in a position to welcome so many of them to the club following the burial and to accommodate Nellie's family. There was however to be no respite from loss and grief. On 7th. Jan last less than 6 weeks after Nellie left us our last remaining founder member Moss Weldon lost his battle with failing health and Moss also died. Speak to any of the older members and they will tell you of the great times they had from the mid-fifties on sailing their herons at Regattas around Dublin Bay and all facilitated by Moss. In 1955 Moss, Tony, Peter Dunne and others built a fleet of Herons and promptly handed them over to be sailed by young fellows who were hanging around the fringes of the sailing activity taking place at Rogerstown. There was no faffing around then with levels and certificates it was straight into the fray. Moss would load up the fleet of boats on the back of his lorry and deliver them to whichever club was hosting an event. Tony would deliver the sailors by van or they would travel by train. The race would be sailed and then the whole operation would happen in reverse with boats and young people returned to base, sometimes in the early hours of the following day. All of this effort of course was on a voluntary basis and laid the foundations for what happens to this day. Moss who had a total recall right up until the end could remember in great detail races and

events that had happened decades ago. In June as all three of them attended the launching of the new Mermaids it was Moss who could talk about previous boat building efforts and launching ceremonies. So as we say goodbye to such stalwarts who served the club as Commodores, committee members and voluntary workers for so many years we are in the happy position of having many of their family members still participating in club activities and continuing the ethos. Anybody who managed to squeeze into the club on the day of Moss's funeral will have seen young David Kelly aged 12 working his heart out to get everyone fed and the clean-up started so I reckon this new generation will throw up just as many workers for the club, a fitting tribute to the three people who have left us in such quick succession this past three months. May they all rest in peace and may their spirits live on for a long time in RSC. Written by Marguerite Carthy
